Whether you're a seasoned law enforcement veteran or you're new to the profession, stepping into this elected position will often feel like you're running all over hell's half acre.

As you may know, or will soon learn, your jail is typically the second most litigated entity in your county – only behind the school district. POLICIES AND PRACTICES TO ADDRESS TEXAS JAIL STANDARDS

First and foremost, as the duly elected Sheriff, you will likely select and empower your subordinates to execute your office's mission. Strong, top-down leadership is essential to your entire office's success – not just yours. Be fair, firm, and consistent in your jail operations.

Observation and documentation will get you out of litigation.

You're no doubt familiar with the phrase, If you didn't log it, it didn't happen. The problem isn't the unfamiliarity with this phrase, but whether it has been consistently enforced and ingrained in your jail's culture.

Let's get more specific.

- How is your staff logging jail rounds?
- When staff are logging observation checks on administrative segregation inmates, are they "pencil whipping"?
- How similar is the description of the past 20 checks?
- Are paper logs logged with uncanny punctuality, such as every 10, 20, 30, and 60 minutes without fail?

Any simple observable pattern is indicative of a bigger problem, especially when it comes to defensibility. Inmates can, and will, exploit any predictable patterns of behavior.

Every jail, prison, and juvenile detention facility must perform security rounds or observation checks on inmates at least every 15, 30, or 60 minutes. Yet over 90% of correctional officers begin their rounds at generally the same time, every time. With no exceptions.



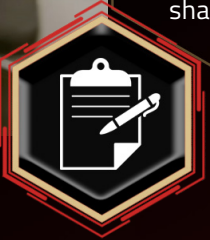
Command Cloud, our officer experience platform (OXP), can identify, break down, and prevent pencil whipping and predictable patterns of behavior. Here's how:

- Jails using Command Cloud equip their staff with purpose-built Android devices called SPARTANs. Each SPARTAN runs a mobile app that displays a series of digital clocks showing how much time remains between rounds, along with audible and visual alerts. It also allows staff to log specific observations on high-risk offenders quickly and accurately.
- If staff log a late check, they can be required to log a late check justification, using tools like talk-to-text. Supervisors can review and verify any late check justifications from anywhere. This feature is highly valued by Texas Jail Inspectors because it empowers your staff to maximize your compliance expectations.

When patterns are predictable, the number of incidents like contraband being smuggled and passed, inmates being assaulted, and self-harm are more likely to occur. This is because as soon as inmates know your pattern, they will alter their actions and behaviors, creating a window of opportunity for these dangerous situations.

If a picture is worth 1,000 words, a video is worth 1,000,000. Your staff's narrative of an event will be questioned by the media and court of public opinion. It will be wrongly presumed you made a mistake or that your staff committed a crime. To defend against this, you need reliable digital evidence. With Command Cloud, you can capture digital evidence anywhere in your jail at the point of responsibility – including inside cells during shakedowns or extractions.

Since nearly 50% of all inmate populations consist of individuals with mental health conditions, their level of cooperation can be challenging. If your staff starts observing and logging more aggressive behaviors, staff can capture video or images in the moment to substantiate what was really happening and when.

For example, an inmate at the Fort Bend Co. Jail had covered himself in feces every day he had a scheduled court appearance. His attorney thought staff were making it up and denying his right to appear before the court. With digital video evidence, you have unequivocal proof.

Digital evidence, such as video capturing, strengthens your staff's narrative in incident reports to remove any potential doubt. In this respect, your team is always working proactively versus being caught unprepared in a media maelstrom when negative events may occur.

REDUCING INMATE COMPLAINTS AND PREVENTING LAWSUITS

Inmate Meals

Consider an approach adopted by Congressman Troy Nehls when he was Sheriff of Fort Bend County: "If you wouldn't eat it, don't serve it." After observing meals being passed to inmates in his jail, which he said he couldn't describe – let alone imagine eating himself, he requested his jail administrator to work with the jail's food provider to radicalize the menu. Sheriff Nehls only wanted to see menu items that staff would be willing to eat, like hot dogs and hamburgers, despite the increase in food costs.

Be smart about where to spend money and where to save it. If meal quality can be improved within your budget, do it.

Some best practices include:

1. Collect as Much Inmate Data as Possible:

Document whether an inmate accepted or declined a meal to prevent inmate complaints or grievances. The more data that can be provided about the inmate and overall situation, the more defensible your facility. Lawsuits can arise due to not providing and documenting meals in general, not providing the appropriate special diet (diabetic, religious meal, etc.), and/or not properly documenting meal refusals.

2. Document Meal Refusals:

When an inmate refuses a meal, staff must document the reasoning. For example, if the hot meal is served ice cold, this becomes an issue you should take up with your food vendor.

3. Capture Necessary Evidence:

Agencies may also require video footage of any refusal or a photo of the tray so the agency captures the exact tray the inmate is refusing.

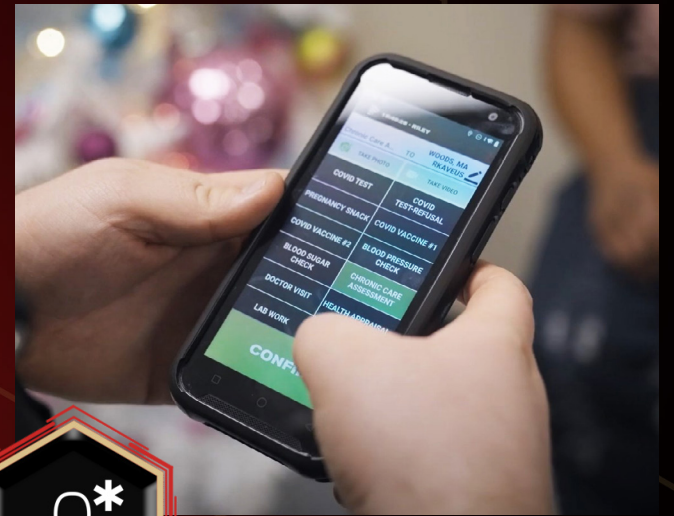


Medical Access

Medical is necessary, and the cost of medical bills at Medicare rates is significantly cheaper than the costs of a lawsuit.

Allegations from inmates about the lack of or denial of medical access are among the most litigious areas of inmate management. As emphasized throughout this guide, your team must have a clear policy and consistent expectations for rigorously documenting medical access – both when it's offered and whether an inmate accepts or declines the offer.

A huge portion of your jail population will have mental health issues. So, it's important to work closely with your mental health providers. If they are not meeting your needs, it's worth the investment to either supplement your resources or make a change. You don't want suicides.



Supplies Issued

Lawsuits can arise if there is no documentation that hygiene or other supplies are offered and refused. Most policies include language that officers must document when inmates accept or refuse these supplies. Whether an inmate receives toilet paper or certified legal mail, it's important to document the offering.

With Command Cloud, inmates can digitally sign to verify acceptance of any item. You can also track items such as razors, clippers, and cleaning supplies – which can be potential weapons and objects of convenience and self-harm.

Medication Administration

On average, 60% of inmate populations in facilities that use GUARDIAN RFID require prescribed medication or request over-the-counter medication during scheduled medication passes.

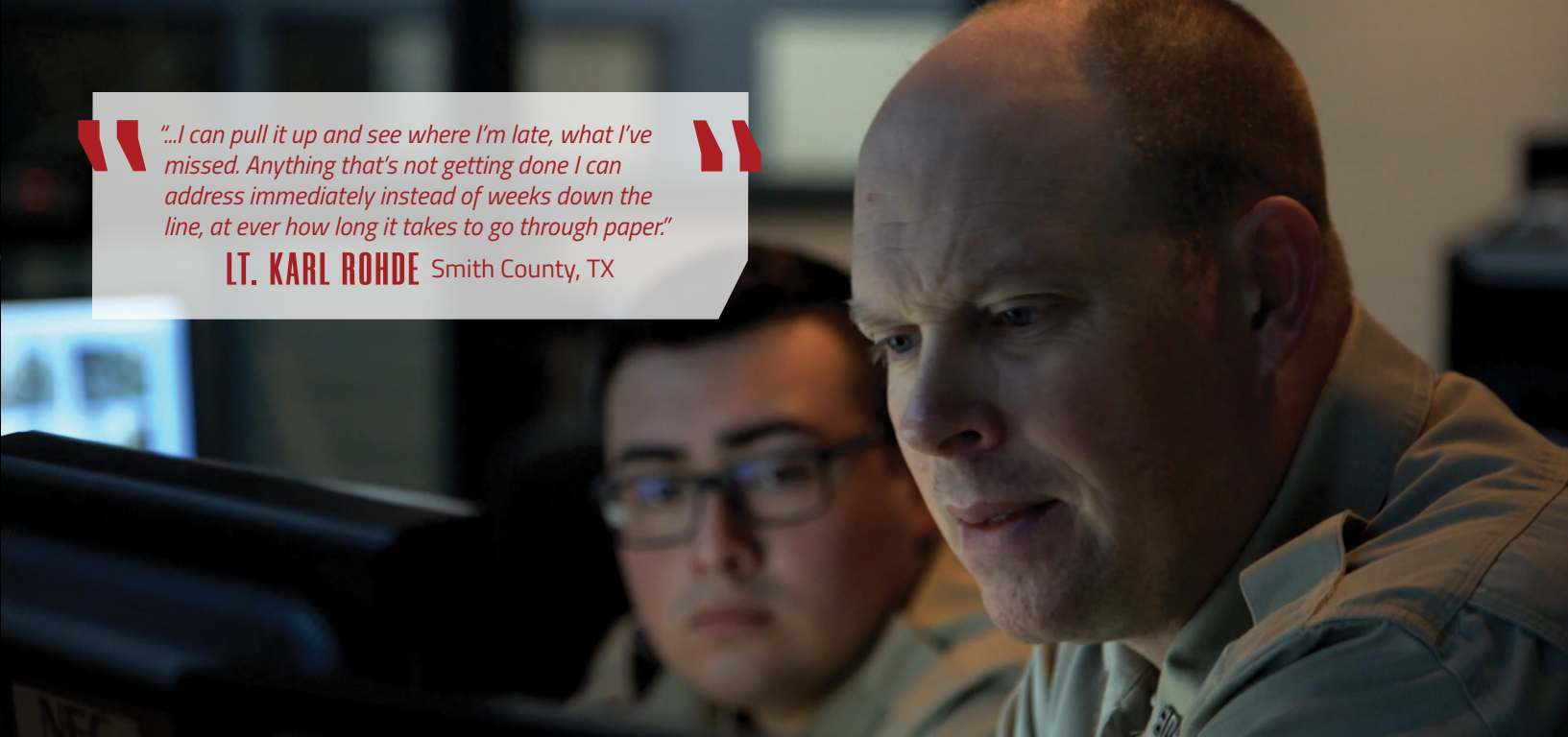
This high demand for medication management underscores the importance of meticulous documentation to ensure staff remain compliant with facility healthcare policies. Failing to maintain accurate records of medication administration increases the risk of litigation and allegations of deliberate indifference. In fact, the most common type of inmate lawsuit involves claims of inadequate medical care, even surpassing claims of excessive force or denial of religious practices.

Command Cloud helps you document when prescription medications and over-the-counter (OTC) medications are offered to inmates. It also documents whether the inmate accepted or refused the medications. All interactions are digitally recorded, including inmate signatures that verify the med pass.

Records Retention and Retrieval

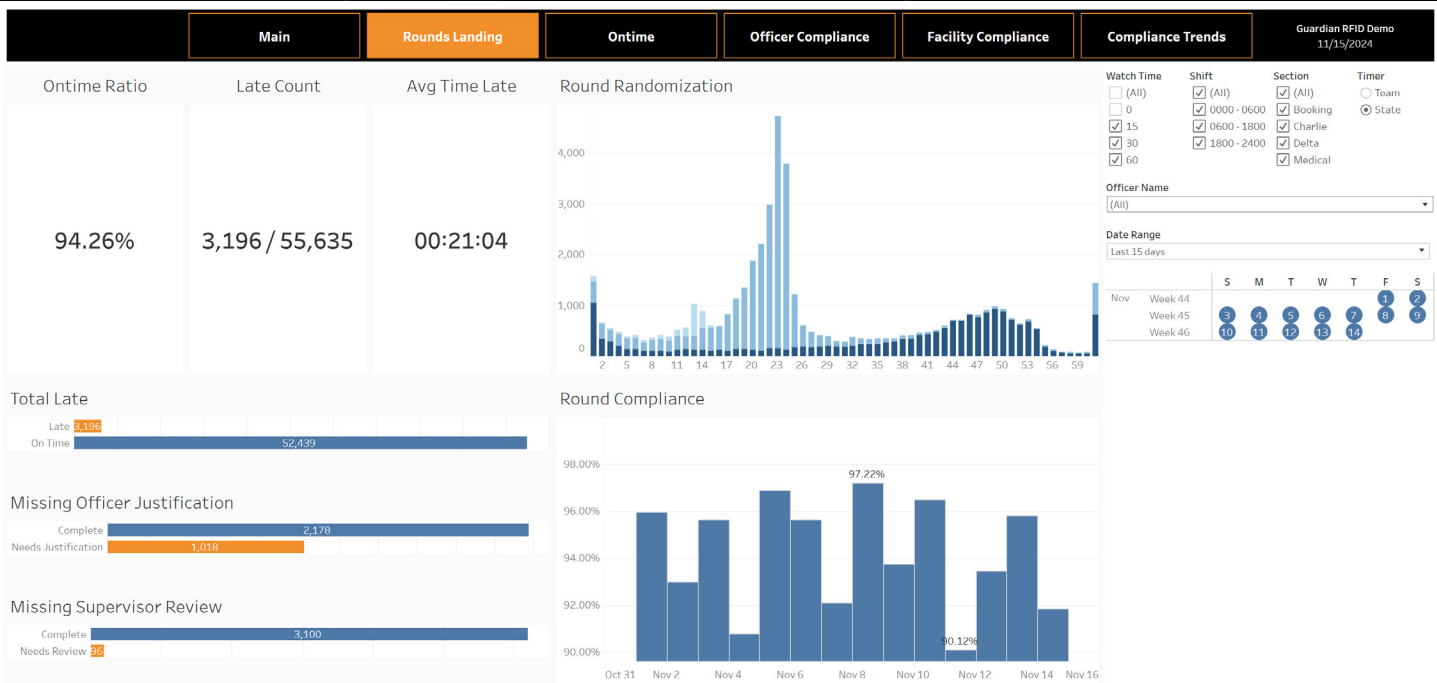

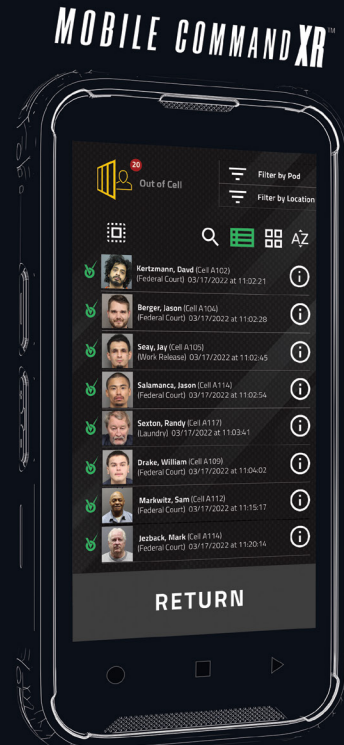
